WHEN ARE THE SATS TESTS THIS YEAR?

- Monday 14th May Key stage 2 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test, Paper 1, short answer questions. Key stage 2 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test, Paper 2, spelling.
- Tuesday 15th May- Key stage 2 English reading test, reading booklet and associated answer booklet.
- Wednesday 16th May- Key stage 2 mathematics, Paper 1 arithmetic test. Key stage 2 mathematics, Paper 2 reasoning.
- Thursday 17th May- Key stage 2 mathematics, Paper 3, reasoning.

THE SPAG TESTS

- The grammar, punctuation and spelling test will consist of two parts:
 a grammar and punctuation paper requiring short answers, lasting 45
 minutes, and an aural spelling test of 20 words, lasting around 15 minutes.
- The grammar and punctuation test will include two sub-types of questions:
- Selected response, e.g. 'Identify the adjectives in the sentence below'
- Constructed response, e.g. 'Correct/complete/rewrite the sentence below,' or, 'The sentence below has an apostrophe missing. Explain why it needs an apostrophe.'

THE READING TEST

- The reading test will be a single paper with questions based on three passages of text. Your child will have one hour, including reading time, to complete the test.
- There will be a selection of question types, including:
- Ranking/ordering, e.g. 'Number the events below to show the order in which they happen in the story'
- Labelling, e.g. 'Label the text to show the title of the story'
- **Find and copy**, e.g. 'Find and copy one word that suggests what the weather is like in the story'
- Short constructed response, e.g. 'What does the bear eat?'
- Open-ended response, e.g. 'Look at the sentence that begins Once upon a time.'
 How does the writer increase the tension throughout this paragraph? Explain fully, referring to the text in your answer.'






THE MATHS TESTS


- Children will sit three papers in maths:
- Paper 1: **arithmetic**, 30 minutes
- Papers 2 and 3: **reasoning**, 40 minutes per paper
- Paper 1 will consist of fixed response questions, where children have to give the correct answer to calculations, including long multiplication and division. Papers 2 and 3 will involve a number of question types, including:
- Multiple choice
- True or false
- Constrained questions, e.g. giving the answer to a calculation, drawing a shape or completing a table or chart
- Less constrained questions, where children will have to explain their approach for solving a problem












These two pie charts show the results.






