



Summer 2 – Painting Artist: Claude Monet, Paul Nash

In painting I have already learnt:

That paintbrushes can differ in appearance and purpose and can reflect a certain style or movement To select and use a paintbrush for a specific purpose (round or pointed, flat square, filbert, fan flat, detail brushes)

That texture can be applied to a surface prior to painting via the use of gesso, grout, sand etc to enhance the mood of an artwork.

That 3D objects have a tactile texture and when this is captured in a painting it is called an implied texture.

To use scaling, scaling is accurate

There are 4 types of perspective: • 1-point perspective • 2-point perspective • 3-point perspective • Multipoint perspective

To begin to consider and use 1 and 2 point perspective

That the horizon line is a horizontal line that runs across the paper or canvas to represent the viewer's eye level, or outline where the sky meets the ground.

That the vanishing point is where receding parallel lines diminish.

To select paint types based on their properties and the purpose of the artwork To blend colours softly with no definition

Art words I have learnt:

Blending, washes, directional, brushstrokes, symbolic, layered, perspective, horizonal line, translucent, opaque foreground, background, proportion, contours, palette knife, realism, filbert, manipulated, tertiary, complementary, refine, texture, composition, diminish

I can select paintbrushes for a purpose

I can use directional brush strokes to create form in a painting

I can refine shapes and lines using controlled strokes
